## Part 1: Noun Phrases Lesson

### Introduction to noun phrases (1)

A noun phrase is a group of words that contains a noun but not a verb



the **four** friends

the **purple** planet

the **red** flag

Noun phrases often include **adjectives** that tell us more about the *noun*

## Introduction to noun phrases (2)



a noun phrase has a noun plus other words, such as **adjectives** or *prepositional phrases* that describe the noun

**the two, green** aliens *in the spaceship*

noun phrase = nouns + **adjectives** + *prepositional phrase*

A noun phrase never has a verb in it

## Introduction to noun phrases (3)



More than one noun phrase can be used in a description

the purple alien

with

five different-size eyes

1st noun phrase

2nd noun phrase

A noun phrase can be just a noun + a determiner

Determiners are words that are used before nouns such as:

a      an      the      this      those      that



determiner	noun	noun phrase
a	campsite	a campsite
the	fire	the fire
their	tent	their tent
that	rucksack	that rucksack

## A noun phrase can be just a determiner and a noun



*adjectives can be added  
to a noun phrase to tell us  
more about the noun  
this is called expanding  
the noun phrase*

determiner + noun = noun phrase

adjectives can expand noun phrases

a

campsite

a quiet and peaceful campsite

that

fire

that nice warm fire

their

tent

their new blue tent

the

rucksack

the heavy purple rucksack

## A noun phrase often includes a determiner



determiners can tell us how **many** or how **few**

determiner	noun	noun phrase
two	anchors	two anchors
several	sails	several sails
three	gunports	three gunports

nouns name things

*adjectives* describe them

*adjectives* and **determiners** can be used in a noun phrase  
to give more information about the noun



this is called **expanding** the noun phrase

**the** puppy

**the** *small, cute* puppy

noun phrase

expanded noun phrase

Adjectives can expand noun phrases

**Prepositional phrases** can also **expand** noun phrases



*a noun phrase  
can include a  
prepositional phrase*

*a noun phase  
ends once you  
get to a verb*

The friends	on the ski lift	looked	at the slopes.
noun phrase	prepositional phrase	verb	prepositional phrase
the friends on the ski life		<i>the noun phrase is over</i>	
expanded noun phrase			

A noun phrase can include  
determiners, adjectives, adverbs and nouns



the	planet			the planet
determiner	noun			<i>noun phrase</i>
their	faraway	purple	planet	their faraway purple planet
determiner	adjective	adjective	noun	<i>noun phrase</i>
that	really	strange	planet	that really strange planet
determiner	adverb	adjectives	noun	<i>noun phrase</i>

Noun phrases always have a **head noun**  
that the whole noun phrase is about



noun phrase

the phone with lots of different apps on it

the **head noun** in this noun phrase is

**phone**

*everything in this noun phrase is describing the phone*

*reminder*

All the words in a noun phrase are about **one** noun

this noun is called the **head noun**



the smiling alien with the long red tongue

noun phrase

the **head noun** in this noun phrase is

**alien**

*because everything in this noun phrase is describing the alien*

*reminder*

As well as a determiner + a noun  
a noun phrase might also have an **adjective**



*adjectives can  
expand  
noun phrases*

determiner	adjectives	noun	expanded noun phrase
those	<b>fun, excited</b>	aliens	those fun, excited aliens
the	<b>red and white</b>	tent	the red and white tent

*a noun phrase never has a verb in it*

You have seen that adjectives can **expand** noun phrases



*prepositional  
phrases can  
also expand  
noun phrases*

the rock climber

under the mountain precipice

noun phrase

prepositional phrase

the rock climber under the mountain precipice

*this **expanded** noun phrase includes the prepositional phrase*

## Prepositional phrases can also **expand** noun phrases



*prepositional phrases  
can describe  
where something  
or someone is*

the ski instructor

on the mountain slope

noun phrase

prepositional phrase

this expanded noun phrase includes the *prepositional phrase*

the ski instructor *on the mountain slope*

the *prepositional phrase* does not make sense without the noun phrase

## Prepositional phrases are not always part of a noun phrase



expanded noun phrase	action verb	prepositional phrase
The children <i>in the sea life centre</i>	<b>walked</b>	<i>under the tunnel.</i>
this <i>prepositional phrase</i> <b>is</b> part of the noun phrase because it is part of the description of the <b>noun</b> children	verbs are never part of a noun phrase	this <i>prepositional phrase</i> is <b>not</b> a noun phrase because it <i>starts</i> with a preposition

## Noun phrases never have a verb in them

once a *verb* is added then a noun phrase is over - but a prepositional phrase or another noun phrase can follow the verb



noun phrase before the verb	action verb	prepositional phrase that follows the verb
The fish <i>in the aquarium</i>	<b>swam</b>	<u>around the children.</u>
noun phrase that has a <i>prepositional phrase</i> in it	this verb <b>ends</b> the noun phrase	<i>prepositional phrase</i> that starts with a <u><i>preposition</i></u>

A noun phrase ends when it meets a verb



The pirates *on the ship* raced to the island.

the pirates <i>on the ship</i>	<b>raced</b>	<i>to the island</i>
this is a noun phrase that includes a <i>prepositional phrase</i>	a noun phrase always <b>ends</b> when it meets a verb	this is a <i>prepositional phrase</i> that starts with the preposition <u>to</u>

A sentence can have more than one noun phrase



noun phrase 1	action verb	noun phrase 2
Dexter in his red wet suit	surfed	the huge waves.
	verbs are <b>never</b> part of a noun phrase	

## A noun phrase can **always** be replaced by a **pronoun**



The two pirates

opened

the treasure chest.

this noun phrase can be  
replaced by a pronoun

verb

this noun phrase can  
be replaced by a pronoun

They



opened

it.



*if it is a **noun phrase** you can replace it with a **pronoun***

## A prepositional phrase **cannot** be replaced by a **pronoun**



The pirate with the eye patch		stared	at the chest of gold.	
noun phrases <b>can</b> be replaced by a pronoun		verb	prepositional phrase	
He	✓	stared	at the chest of gold.	
He	✓	stared	it.	✗
noun phrases <b>can</b> be replaced by a pronoun		verb	prepositional phrases <b>cannot</b> be replaced by a pronoun	

## Noun phrases can be used with different **action verb** tenses (1)



The parrot on the palm tree	<b>guarded</b>	the treasure chest.
noun phrase	simple tense	noun phrase
The parrot on the palm tree	<b>is guarding</b>	the treasure chest.
noun phrase	progressive tense	prepositional phrase

## Noun phrases can be used with different **action verb** tenses (2)



actions verbs can be used with noun phrases to describe the

### **action**

that someone or something in the sentence is doing

The pirate flag on the chest

**flapped**

in the wind.

noun phrase

simple tense

noun phrase

The pirate flag on the chest

**was flapping**

in the wind.

noun phrase

progressive tense

prepositional phrase

<i>reminder</i>	The <b>noun phrases</b> in this lesson were used with <b>action verbs</b>
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*actions verbs can  
be **linked** to  
noun phrases to  
describe the action  
that someone or  
something in the  
sentence is doing*

The excited reporters	waited	at the airport.
noun phrase about the <b>reporters</b>	what action the reporters are doing	prepositional phrase that tells us where the reporters waited

## A noun phrase **ends** once a verb is added



*noun phrases and prepositional phrases can be used with **action verbs***

*noun phrases and prepositional phrases can also be used with **linking verbs** - these are covered in another lesson*

The two excited aliens

**played**

on a faraway island..

noun phrase

action verb

prepositional phrase

The two excited aliens

**are**

on a faraway island.


noun phrase

linking verb

prepositional phrase

In this lesson you have looked at noun phrases that were used with action verbs

**noun phrases** can also be used with **linking verbs**



*linking verbs can be linked to noun phrases or prepositional phrases to describe **where** something or someone is or **what** something or someone is like*

This sentence does not have an action in it - it is describing **where** the owl is

The owl with the book about trees	is	in the library.
noun phrase	linking verb	prepositional phrase

*using noun phrases with linking verbs is covered in another lesson*



SATs questions on noun phrases might ask you to identify the **longest possible** noun phrase

reminder: a noun phrase never includes a verb

noun phrases	verb	prepositional phrases
The internet café at the end of the street*	<b>opened</b>	on Friday morning at 9am.
The new 24 hour internet café	<b>is opening</b>	on Friday with a free party.
The new internet café in the town	<b>stood</b>	next to the library in the high street.
the head noun is what a noun phrase is about so café is the head noun in all the sentences *this is the longest possible noun phrase about the café in the sentences above	<i>a noun phrase always <b>stops</b> at the verb</i>	<i>these are <b>not</b> noun phrases because they start with a preposition</i>
