reminder

Introduction to noun phrases

A noun phrase is a group of words that contains a noun but not a verb



the **four** friends

the **purple** planet

the **red** flag

noun phrases often include **adjectives** that tell us more about the *noun*

reminder

All the words in a noun phrase are about one noun
this noun is called the **head noun**



the smiling alien with the long red tongue

noun phrase

the **head noun** in this noun phrase is

alien

because everything in this noun phrase is describing the alien

<i>reminder</i>	Adjectives can expand noun phrases		
	prepositional phrases can also expand noun phrases		
			<p><i>a noun phrase can include a prepositional phrase</i></p> <p><i>a noun phase ends once you get to a verb</i></p>
The friends	on the ski lift	looked	at the slopes.
noun phrase	prepositional phrase	verb	prepositional phrase
the friends on the ski life		<i>the noun phrase is over</i>	
expanded noun phrase			

reminder

A noun phrase can include determiners,
adjectives, adverbs and nouns



the	planet			the planet
determiner	noun			<i>noun phrase</i>
their	faraway	purple	planet	their faraway purple planet
determiner	adjective	adjective	noun	<i>noun phrase</i>
that	really	strange	planet	that really strange planet
determiner	adverb	adjectives	noun	<i>noun phrase</i>

reminder

As well as a determiner + a noun
a noun phrase might also have an **adjective**



*adjectives can
expand
noun phrases*

determiner	adjectives	noun	expanded noun phrase
those	fun, excited	aliens	those fun, excited aliens
the	red and white	tent	the red and white tent

a noun phrase never has a verb in it

<i>reminder</i>	The noun phrases in this lesson were used with action verbs	
	 <p><i>actions verbs can be linked to noun phrases to describe the action that someone or something in the sentence is doing</i></p>	
The excited reporters	waited	at the airport.
noun phrase about the reporters	what action the reporters are doing	prepositional phrase that tells us where the reporters waited

A noun phrase **ends** once a verb is added



*noun phrases and prepositional phrases can be used with **action verbs***

*noun phrases and prepositional phrases can also be used with **linking verbs** - these are covered in the next lesson*

Making a Presentation and a Video

You have finished this topic. Now you and your partner are going to use your notes from part 1 (the lesson) and the reminders in this part to make a presentation on **noun phrases** to another pair.



first you and your partner pair will make a presentation to another pair

then the other pair will make a presentation to you and your partner

then both pairs will work together to create a video about noun phrases

Use your notes from the lesson to give a short presentation about noun phrases to another pair.

In your presentation you and your partner need to explain and give your own examples of the following to the other pair:

A noun phrase is a group of words that contains a *noun* but not a verb e.g. the red flag

A noun phrase tells us more about a noun e.g. what colour the flag is - red.

A noun phrase ends when a **verb** is added e.g. the red flag fluttered

A noun phrase can be just a determiner and a noun e.g. a flag or the flag

A noun phrase has a noun plus other words, such as *adjectives* or **prepositional phrases** that describe the noun and which are used to expand the noun phrase e.g. the four friends on the ski lift

A noun phrase always has a **head** noun that the whole noun phrase is about e.g. the smiling **alien** with the long red tongue

A noun phrase can always be replaced by a pronoun e.g. The flag... It...

Noun phrases can be used with different action verb tenses e.g. The pirate flag flapped in the wind. (**simple** tense) The pirate flag was flapping in the wind. (**progressive** tense)



The other pair will now give *their* presentation on noun phrases to you and your partner.

Both pairs will now work together because they are now experts on noun phrases

You can tell that we are now an expert group!



Both pairs are now experts in this topic because they have now both **given** and **heard** a presentation on the topic.

After both pairs have seen each other's presentation, both pairs are now going to work together to form an expert group.

The four experts are now going to make a short video on the noun phrases for other pupils to watch.

Each pair should first ask each other questions to increase and deepen their knowledge of this topic before they start to make their video.

After you have made your video, look at the next screen.
