## An Introduction to Paragraphs

When you write a story (and in most other types of writing), you will write more than one sentence. To make your work easy to read, your sentences must follow on from each other in a logical way. You will need to put each new sentence that you write after the last one, in a way that makes sense.

A group of sentences that are about one thing, and follow on from each other in a way that makes sense, is called a paragraph.

	<p><b>First</b> words need to be put together in the correct way to make a sentence</p>
	<p><b>Second</b> sentences need to be put together in the correct way to make a paragraph</p>

If you are writing a story you need to organise the sentences into separate paragraphs. A paragraph contains a group of sentences that are about one topic. When something changes in your story, you will need to start a new paragraph.

The different parts of your story should always be put into separate paragraphs. This makes the story easier to read. You can do this by starting a new paragraph on the next line after the last paragraph has finished.

It is important when you write a story, to keep all the information about the same thing in the same paragraph. However, you also need to remember to start a new paragraph when something changes. There are five separate occasions when you need to start a new paragraph.

## The Five Reasons to Start a new Paragraph

It is important when you write to keep all the information about the same thing in one paragraph. However, you also need to remember to start a new paragraph when something changes.

You need to start a new paragraph every time something in a story changes. The **five** reasons for something changing in a story are:

1

when something **new** happens in the story

2

when the **setting** in the story changes

3

when the **time** in the story changes

4

when a new **character** appears in the story

5

every time someone in the story **speaks**

You are now going to learn about the **fifth** reason for starting a new paragraph.

## Reason 5

## Reason 5

You need to start a new paragraph when someone different **speaks** in the story

A new paragraph is needed now as a new person is speaking. A fireman arrives on the scene. Write what the fireman says.




## Individual Activity
